

Something A Little Different

Here's a story from Northeastern Region's Hudson Berkshire Division newsletter, President Paul Hoffman's column:
Having problems with your layout? Track not doing well? Need to repair a section or two? Then you can sympathize with Norfolk Southern Corp, which bought 4.7 million wood ties in 2011 and started installing them in 2012. (Note: That's enough for about 1467 miles of mainline track!!!) And now those ties are deteriorating and will need to be replaced. Inspections and analyses have shown that the wood was treated with 'a blackening agent' and not pressure treated with creosote as was required by contract and as was done to the samples presented to earn the contract award. Most of the delivered ties had the correct appearance but not the necessary resistance to weather and rot. Legal proceedings are of course underway. And you thought your track was troublesome.

There are two main weekend public Train Shows in Coast Division this season: First, the Los Altos Train Days, September 16th & 17th, followed by the Great Train Show's return to Craneway Pavilion in Richmond, November 24th and 25th — after a couple years away. I've enjoyed volunteering at both venues multiple times over several years. I invite YOU to Volunteer, too! No experience required!

These are different train shows, each fun for similar AND different reasons: they both attract large numbers of kids with their parents, plus many other train loving folks. Both Venues have their own beauty; Los Altos' Museum is a pleasant tree-filled setting, while Craneway Pavilion has beautiful pier views of the Bay, alongside the Rosie The Riveter Museum.

The Los Altos History Museum's Train Days celebrates the train history of Los Altos, when Foothill Expressway used to be a peninsula commuter train right of way, and Los Altos was one of its stops. Our John Allen Time Saver has been very popular at this show: we are mainly looking for volunteers to enjoy helping us introduce Time Saver's operational switching fun to kids of all ages. There are several portable modular trains set up mainly outdoors around the museum: The Diablo Valley Shortline & BAGRS Live Steamers, Lionel groups, the Swanton Pacific RR near Davenport, the Stop/Look/Listen Train Safety volunteers, and more. A Snack Food Vendor and the Museum Gift shop are the only on-site sellers.

The Great Train Show is a much larger commercial show with more portable modular train groups set up inside the pavilion, a rubber wheeled train to ride outside, plus many vendor selling tables. Again, our John Allen Time Saver is very popular at this show: we are again looking for volunteers to enjoy helping us introduce Time Saver's operational switching fun to kids of all ages. We should also have some table space to actively demonstrate modeling, including but not limited to building models. painting figures, etc. We also hope to have volunteers to help display and explain an N or HO Scale Build Your Dream small modular layout.

All NMRA Volunteer opportunities count towards the Volunteer Achievement Award. IMO, more importantly, we volunteer to answer questions of kids and parents just getting started in our hobby and help and encourage them by pointing them towards local resources to help them grow their interests in Trains and Model Railroading, including maybe even someday joining or re-joining the NMRA. We invite anyone and everyone interested to our local events, and also try to inform everyone who will listen or read our handouts about many other train related resources in our area.

In addition to Good Karma for helping others enjoy trains more, volunteers enjoy free Admission to also enjoy the events they Volunteer for, when we enjoy breaks from volunteering. We do pay our own transportation and parking, but we also carpool when we can.

I've volunteered for nearly ALL Train Show events since I rejoined NMRA in Fall 2000 at


