

200 issues of the Coast Dispatcher

Prior to August, 1968 the Coast Division sent a quarterly flyer to announce the next meetings. In August the first issue of the Coast Division News was sent out with the intent of being a newsletter, not simply a meeting flyer.

There was a contest to name the newsletter with the winner getting a year's paid up membership in the PCR. The winner was Chief Clerk Bob Dupont, who came up with "Coast Dispatcher." Issue #3 was the first Dispatcher with that name. It became the Coast Dispatcher.

This is a history of the Dispatcher. Starting on the next page, we will show what the cover looked like on every 5 year anniversary, and will give a quick view of what the Coast Division was doing that year and a short view of the clinics and contests at the meet that the anniversary copy of the Dispatcher was promoting.

There is one story about the division that is interesting and worth telling here. At the Coast meets, lunch is now provided by a couple of members who make it happen. The history of how we got there is fun.



In May of 1966, before the Dispatcher came out, a group of ladies got together to set up their first snack bar at the meet at the Menlo Park Club. They called themselves the Railettes. They used the money they made at the snack bars to go on outings. The leader of this group was Dorothy Keeler, and in Issue #2 she started publicizing their activities. On Feb 21, 1969 they used their money to take a field trip to the Presidio.

In Issue #6 (Dec 69) she talked about their bus trip to the Allied Arts Guild in Menlo Park during the 1970 convention.

In Issue #8 (Sept 70) she talked about the 72 Railettes who attended lunch at Ricky's and then took the bus trip during the 1970 convention.

In Issue #31 (Nov 75) she discussed the activities at the mini-convention and in Issue #33 stated that their convention fund was growing and they were getting a lot of extras that the convention fees did not cover.

In issue #35 (May 76) she stated that 80 Railettes attended the mini convention. Some took Amtrak to Santa Barbara. The Railettes were clearly at their peak.


In issue #54 (Dec 81) Dorothy reported that Mary Hogan would be in charge. No reason was given.

In Issue #55 (Mar 82) it was reported that Mary Hogan was the new Railette Chair. Participation was way down.

In Issue #57 (Sept 82) Mary resigned as chair. The Snack bar was run by the San Jose Society of Model Railroaders.

In issue #60 (May 1983) the Railettes were officially dead (i.e. removed from the Callboard) Since then we have had a number of providers, from Rainbow Girls to Jobs Daughters, to now individual members.

There are other stories about the Coast Division one gets by reading through all these old Dispatchers. The story of the Railettes was just one of them. I couldn't tell them all on one page.







Superintendent's Report By Jim Long

I would like to thank the membership for the election and vote on the Constitution and By Laws at the March meet. The current team of officers was redected and the proposed Constitution and By Laws were approved. Copies of the Constitution and By-laws will be available at the June Meet for those who would like a copy.

The election means that I am starting my second 2-year term as Superintendent. There is a limit of 2 consecutive 2-year terms as Superintendent in the By-laws. This means that the next election for Superintendent in 2005 I cannot run for reelection. We are looking for people that would like to help run the Coast Division in the future. After the March 2005 meet there has to be someone eles step forward to take up reins and become Superintendent. This is also true for job of Director to the PCR Board of Operations. Jack Wall, the current Director, is starting the last year of his second term. We will need someone to run for this position as well. The election of Director will start with nominations at the December 2003 Meet with an election by mail in early 2004. Please start thinking about this and consider running for office. It isn't a hard job but it takes a little time. You do get to do many different things that the average member doesn't get to do or see. The job of Director is to represent the Coast Division Membership at the PCR Board of Operations. This means contact with the membership of Coast Division and representatives of the other division. The most important thing is the people you get to meet and work with. This is the major benefit of my membership in Coast Division, PCR and NMRA.

I was pleased with the contest at the last meet. Al Dalcher ran the contest in the main room. A popular vote was used which had over 60 votes. The contest for the June Meet will follow a similar format. The categories will be Structure, Display and Traction. I want to thank Al for taking on the job of Model Contest Chairperson.

Rodney Pruitt passed away around the end of March. You may remember him or his dad, Hollis that came to the March Meet in Santa Clara. We will miss him. The auction seems to be getting smaller than it was a few years ago. This and the raffle ticket sales are the only source of income for the division. We do not charge an admission for the Coast meets but we do have considerable expenses. The cost to print and mail the Coast Dispatcher is about 5400 an issue. We also make a domain to the schools where we meet for the use on the facilities. For the last few meets the income has not meet the expenses. This situation cannot continue. The meets are free but if everyone bought 55 worth of raffle tickets we would have a positive cash flow. Please consider doing this at the meets. The auction is still the major source on income. Please bring your items to sell in the auction. This is a good way to dispose of excess equipment that you have accumulated and helps the division. It also gives you some extra money for your hobby!

The next Coast Division Meet will be June 1, 2003 at the California School for the Deaf in Premont. We will again hold the contest in the main room. We feel this provides more interest in the contest. We will again have a popular vote. We are looking for members to present clinics at this and other meets. John Marshall is beating the bushes looking for clinics. This is not hard to do and its a great way to share your expertise in the hobby. Please consider presenting a clinic at the Coast Division Meets. This is a very important part of the program. Please see John Marshall for times that are available.

The Tri-Valley Zephyr 2003 PCR Convention has just finished. We had a great time. The Coast Division sponsored the convention. We are also selling the Tri-Valley Zephyr Convention Car. This is a Branchline Trains HO 40' ARAR Boxcar with a 7' door in the Blueprint series. This is a very accurate car in the original white lettering. The build date is 8-47. The proceeds of the car sates all go to the division. They are available for \$15 and will be at the June Meet.

At the PCR Convention it was announced that Gene Mayer from Sierra Division was elected President and Dave Connery was elected Vice President. They have taken over their offices. Congratulations to both. I feel that the PCR is in seed basels.



There are only 199 issues listed as being issued even though the numbers go to 200. There are duplicate numbers (2 issues #42 in Sept and Dec 1978), issues not found and cases where the number count doesn't add up etc. The 200 issues used corresponds to the number of issues that should have been issued in the 50 years from August 1968 to June 2018 at issues 4 per year. All issues were numbered up until #128. All numbers after that until 192 were not on the actually issued Dispatcher, but were re-created after determining what the numbers should be. A complete accounting is available for those who are interested.

Ralph Marcos's first 9 Dispatchers were all a basic mimeograph format. Each column had a graphic symbol for the contributor.

Don McCord went to a sleeker format and the graphic symbol for each contributor went away. The previous discussion about the Railettes showed a typical symbol that went away. For issue 20 in June 73, he brought back the symbols for each report. The format was 8 1/2 X 14. In February 1974 he went to the 11x17 format.

In June 1977 Gladys Adams took over. She maintained the existing format until Dec 1988 when she made some minor changes to the icons on the side. They were now all Santa Claus. In March 1989 she got rid of the little icons by each article. In June 1989 Bob Ferguson went to a bolder text logic. In September 1989 Peter Wiglin maintained the previous logic.

In June 1990, Richard Brennan went bold. During his tenure the Dispatcher went bolder and more graphic oriented.

In May 1998, Brandon Lloyd maintained the logic Richard Brennan had set up, but with different graphics. We then went through a period of uncertainty. In March 2001 Bill Nichols went to a clean text format with little graphics

In March 2001 Bill Nichols started the logic which we now use.

After Tom Crawford took over in June 2005, most of the iterations had more to do with the way to distribute the Dispatcher as opposed to it's content. It has gone through a number of changes, and what you see in the current Dispatchers is the result of you current editor's attempt to keep it up to todays standards.

BTW, this is my swan song. Pete Birdsong will be responsible for issue 201.








art work.

Ron Kolo



Ron Kolo was 75 years old, born in 1943. He retired after 27 years as a Sargent for the Alameda County Sheriff's office. Ron passed away on April 2nd, 2018 after a 2 year battle with Cancer. Ron is survived by his dedicated wife Dee whom he married October 27, 1957 and they had 4 children: Debbie, Terry, Don and Ray along with 11 grandchildren and 4 great grandchildren.

Ron was a great modeler. His primary scale was HO and Hon3 with an emphasis on logging. But he also worked in other scales and could be

found modeling main line steam and diesel. He would have local children come over to look at and run his layout. Ron was very helpful to new modelers and would spend time working with them.

He was an original member of the Yosemite Short Line modular group. Ron's modeling expertise can still be appreciated today when you see the Yosemite Short Line on display. He is the creator of the beautiful sawmill scene on the YSL. Not only was Ron a great modeler but, his interests were wide spread. Some of which were; collecting brass engines and rolling stock, RR craftsman kits, military, guns, and books. Ron was a great friend and will be sorely missed.

Bill Swindell



On January 26, 1943, Charles and Adelite Swindell welcomed into this world their only son Charles William Swindell Jr in Long Beach, California. Bill's father was an Air Force career officer who moved his family around to many Air Force bases including Guam and Texas. Bill finally received his High School diploma at Chicopee High in Massachusetts. His higher education consisted of a 2 year enrollment at Ohio State and 1 year at Napa College in California. It was during his time spent at Air Force bases that he developed his love of electronics.

His working career began in 1964 when he was employed by Sears Roebuck as a repairman for TV's and other appliances. After 4 years of servicing TV's, Bill moved on to a 26 year employment with IBM as a Customer Repair Technician and Engineer for bank check processing equipment and the associated computer systems. In 1994 IBM began downsizing their workforce and Bill was terminated. He then became employed by Clorox Corp. Bill was tasked with writing security software for their worldwide computer network. In 2006, Bill retired from Clorox.

Bill's initial interest in model railroading came in 1968. It was further developed when, in 1969, he became a member of the Walnut Creek Model Railroad Society. About this same time, he also became a member of the N.M.R.A. He became a fixture at the WCMRS by delving into the electronic controls of the club and making them more stable. In 1982, Bill was enlisted by Bob Ferguson to assist him with the operation of an auc-

tion at the Coast Division meets to begin writing the computer software to automate the accounting process of the auctions. He continued in this capacity until his passing. He became a (grumpy?) fixture at the auctions while attending to the buyer's purchases and the seller's reimbursements. Bill also modified the Coast Auction software to operate auctions at PCR convention auctions and finally to support the silent auctions at several N.M.R.A. National Conventions. Since he was also a Ham Radio enthusiast, he also used the auction programs to assist with the Mt. Diablo Amateur Radio Club's auctions.

He became a member of the Bay Area Electric Railway Museum, and eventually got involved with garden railroading where he was well known for his many (over 400) locomotive conversions from track power to battery, RC and Sound. He also wrote and presented many clinics on batteries and locomotive conversions as well as methods of building overhead wire systems for HO streetcars.

Bill is survived by his wife Susan, daughters Sandi MacDougal and Debby Kelly, grandchildren Jack and Megan Kelly, Heather Eaddy and Tabitha Kendle and Great Grandson Dante Eaddy.
