After a 3-year absence, the Daylight Division is returning to Bakersfield, with a "meet/event" on Saturday May 21st at the Beale Memorial Library, 10 AM to 2 PM.



The meeting opens up at 10:00 AM for meet-and-greet, sign-in and contest entries. The clinics will begin at 10:45 AM. The first clinic, presented by Master Model Railroader #242, Ed Hall, will be "*Basic Airbrushing.*" Ed will demonstrate the basics of the airbrush, taping and masking techniques, and how to use paints for the best possible results for your model railroad.

The second clinic will be "*Cheap Sound for HO Scale Mechanical Reefers,*" presented by Brewster Bird, of Visalia. Brewster will demonstrate how to add sound to your HO scale 57' mechanical refrigerator cars for approximately \$20, using parts from your local Radio Shack. This will be a hands-on clinic, so participants can bring their mechanical refrigerator cars, and the below listed parts from Radio Shack:

- 1. Any HO scale mechanical refrigerator car
- 2. 9-Volt, 20-Second Recording Module, Catalog # 276-1323, Cost \$11.95
- 3. Any good 9-volt battery
- 4. 3/32 brass tubing
- 5. Pin vise or hand drill
- 6. Razor saw or moto-tool with cut off wheel
- 7. Safety glasses and gloves
- 8. ACC glue

The Beale Memorial Library is located at 701 Truxtun Ave, Bakersfield. The zip code is 93301 for your GPS. The room we are having the meet in, the "Tejon" Room, is located on the second floor of the library. There are elevators available, and for those that would like to get some early morning exercise, you can use the stairs. The "Tejon" room is in the far southeast corner of the second floor. But, you can simply ask for directions from the person at the front counter of the library as you enter the library. The library is immediately adjacent to the Bakersfield Amtrak Station, so you can bet there will be some prototype action just outside the door. And, no, the Amtrak schedule will not allow you to arrive in time for the 10:00 AM meet start.

The maps to the layouts will be made available at the conclusion of the business meeting, along with the raffle for the \$25.00 door prize and announcement of the raffle drawing winner, so stick around to the end.

To get to the Beale Memorial Library, from north or west of Bakersfield, you will be traveling south on Highway 99. When you come into Bakersfield merge onto CA-204/CA-99 Bus/Golden State Ave via EXIT 27 toward Bakersfield; travel 2.8 miles to 'Q' Street. Turn right onto "Q" Street; travel 0.6 miles to Truxtun Avenue. Turn left onto Truxtun Ave;

Truxtun Ave is just past 17th Street; travel 0.07 miles and the library will be on your right. Use the same street that leads into the Amtrak Station to enter the library's parking lot, which will be on your right.

To get to the Beale Memorial Library from south of Bakersfield, you will be traveling north on Highway 99. When you come into Bakersfield: Take the California Ave exit, EXIT 25, toward Civic Center. At the end of the off-ramp, turn right onto California Ave; travel 1.5 miles to South 'P' Street.

Turn left onto South 'P' Street. Travel 0.1 miles and go under the railroad bridge. As you come up from under the railroad underpass, the stop light will be Truxtun Ave. Turn right onto Truxtun Avenue; travel 0.07 miles and the library will be on your right. Use the same street that leads into the Amtrak Station to enter the library's parking lot, which will be on your right.

To get to the Beale Memorial Library, from east of Bakersfield, you will be traveling west on Highway 58. When you come into Bakersfield:

Take EXIT 111 toward Chester Ave/H Street. The exit will turn into Richland Street; travel 0.2 miles until you come to Chester Ave. Turn right onto Chester Avenue; travel 1.5 miles to Truxtun Avenue. Turn right onto Truxtun Avenue; travel .5 miles. The library will be on your right, just passed 'Q' Street. Use the same street that leads into the Amtrak Station to enter the library's parking lot, which will be on your right.

The Favorite Photo contest category was Track and Structures. Unfortunately there were no entries.

At the next meet on May 21st in Bakersfield the Favorite Model category will be **Steam Locomotive**. According to the PCR Contest Directory this includes all types of steam locomotives. However, entries must be powered. The Favorite Photo category will be **Trains in Action**. The PCR Contest Directory defines this category as "Color prints of available-light images of prototype railroad equipment in motion."

We have not had any models for judging for quite some time. Remember, if you want to get points toward an achievement certificate in model building you need to have your models judged. This can be done at a

meet. Another point is that in order to have your model evaluated for suggestions that may help you get more points, bring it to a meet and a team will help you out. If you have a model that you plan to enter in a Region or National level contest, having it judged at a Division meet first is a good preliminary step.

NMRA Achievement Program **Association Official** By Dave Grenier, Daylight Achievement Chairman

In this installment, we will review the requirements for the Association Official certificate. The full requirements for this certificate are available on the NMRA website at http://www.nmra.org/official. You can also get a copy of the requirements by contacting me, either by phone, e-mail, or letter. Also take a look at the *Scale Rails*, October 2008 issue, page 10, for additional information.

The Association Official certificate, as its name implies, is to recognize an individual's service as an officer at the national, regional, or divisional level. To qualify for this certificate, you must have served as an officer (President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, or Director) and completed satisfactory service in one of the following:

- At least one year in office at the national level.
- At least two years in the office(s) at the regional level, of which one shall be Region President or Trustee.
- At least three years in the office(s) at the regional level, if other than Region President or Trustee.

Division Superintendents or Directors who serve as voting members of the Region Board of Directors, either by election, appointment, or automatic by-law provision, shall be eligible for the certificate on the same basis as any other Region Board member (i.e. three years of service required).

Just to clarify, "satisfactory service" means that you actually have to perform the duties of the office, not just doing nothing while holding the title. There have also been discussions over what offices qualify for Association Official. The general rule of thumb is that if holding an office makes you a voting member of the Regional Board of Directors, then it counts.

In the PCR, Division Directors are voting members of the PCR Board of Directors, so holding this office meets the requirement. On the other hand, although Division Superintendents usually attend the Board meetings, they have no vote; therefore it does not count. However, Superintendents do earn Association Volunteer time units (2 TU) for every month served. Interestingly, since our Division Directors typically serve

for 4 years, the 1st three years qualify them for the Association Official

certificate, while the 4th year earns 12 TUs toward their Association Volunteer certificate. Watch for possible changes regarding this after the April 20, 2016, NMRA Board of Directors meeting.

The final requirement for this certificate is the usual paperwork. You must submit a completed Statement of Qualifications Form (SOQ), listing the offices you held with the dates served, along with the signature of a qualified witness, usually the Region President (Ed Merrin) or

Secretary (Tom Swearingen). Be sure to send a copy of your NMRA membership card along with your paperwork to the PCR AP Manager, Jack Burgess. If you mail it to the President or Secretary for their signature, include a stamped envelope addressed to Jack Burgess, 36129 Sandalwood Street, Newark, CA 94560 and a short note asking them to forward it to Jack.

That's all it takes! In one to three years, depending on what level you serve at, you can earn the Association Official certificate. All you have to do is get involved in the NMRA. To paraphrase JFK, "Ask not what the NMRA can do for you, but ask what I can do for the NMRA." Unlike the other AP certificates, this service-related certificate does not require any judging of your efforts. All you have to do is get involved in the NMRA, do the work and put in the time. Don't be bashful! Jump right in and lend a hand. You'll be glad you did.

I'm happy to announce that **Layton Gillette** qualified for the **Golden Spike Award** since my last report and should have received it by the time you read this. Congratulations, Layton!

Canadian Pacific halts takeover bid of Norfolk Southern

Canadian Pacific Railway's bid to acquire fellow rail giant Norfolk Southern came to an end following months of contentious back-and-forth squabbling and amid heightened scrutiny from the Obama administration on antitrust issues.

Canadian Pacific said that it would no longer pursue the takeover, which it has proposed publically despite Norfolk Southern's repeated rejections.

It also withdrew a resolution that would have required Norfolk Southern shareholders to vote on whether to force deal talks.

"No further financial offers or overtures to meet with the NS board of directors are planned at this time," Canadian Pacific said in a statement.

Norfolk Southern has repeatedly asserted that a merger would draw intense regulatory scrutiny, saying there's a good chance it would have been rejected.

The company also questioned the value of Canadian Pacific's offer and said it could perform well on its own.

The deal's demise comes as the Obama administration has increased scrutiny of mergers in recent months, including the Treasury's department scuttling recently of the proposed Pfizer-Allergan pharmaceutical match-up and the Justice Department's lawsuit to block the oilfield services merger of Halliburton and Baker Hughes.

Also recently the Justice Department said it opposed a voting-trust structure that Canadian Pacific had proposed to the Surface Transportation Board, which reviews proposed railroad mergers.

Under the proposal, Canadian Pacific would have acquired Norfolk Southern, Canadian Pacific's stock would have been placed in trust and its current CEO would have become CEO of Norfolk Southern before an antitrust review could be completed, according to the Justice Department.

"A distinguished member of the hobby industry for nearly 50 years, Lee's professional career began in 1967 as one of original staff members of Pro Custom Hobbies in Catonsville, Maryland. He was director of product development of Associated Hobby Manufacturers before joining Philadelphia-based Bachmann Industries Ltd., the world's largest model train maker, in the 1980s as Director Product Development and later Vice President of Product Development until his death. During his career, he also worked or consulted for GSB, Lionel, Life-Like Products, MDC, Model Power, TYCO, Westside Models, and others.

"Lee was a longtime active member of the National Model Railroad Association (NMRA) and received the association's prestigious Pioneer Award and the Distinguished Service Award. He was inducted into the Model Railroad Industry's Hall of fame in 2004. He was also a valued member of the NMRA Howell Day Museum Committee, representing industry interests and bringing a wealth of knowledge and history.

"He was widely known as an innovator in the model train industry. He is the inventor or co-inventor on eight industry patents granted by the United States Patent and Trademark Office.

"Lee was one of 100 volunteers who helped bring America's history to the country by participating in the rebuilding of the T-1-class, No. 2101, the first steam engine to pull the American Freedom Train, during the nation's Bicentennial celebration. The steam engine remains on display at the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad Museum in Baltimore.

Considerations For Inviting Speakers To Your Convention By Tony Koester

I've been asked to give clinics and after-dinner talks at venues literally around the world since 1969. I very much appreciate the honor, as do others who receive similar invitations.

There are several considerations that we should all be aware of, however, that will help to avoid anyone being in an embarrassing or financially untenable situation. Based on decades of presenting talks and on discussions with others who are often asked to do this, I have prepared a list of expectations and customs.

Speakers asked to give a talk in their home Region or Division do not usually expect to have any expenses covered. It's just part of being an active and participating member of a Region or Division.

When I was elected At-large Director, Worldwide, one of my first proposals was to compensate those who are asked to give clinics at National Conventions.

When the officers and directors worked through the numbers, however, it quickly became apparent that any significant compensation such as free lodging or even registration would cause the basic registration fee to grow significantly. That said, in my view clinicians who attend the National only for the day they present their clinic should, at a minimum, be allowed to register at a one-day rate. Even though it is a distinct honor to be asked to give a clinic at a National Convention and counts toward an Achievement Program certificate, perhaps some means of offsetting expenses for National clinicians will one day be worked out by the leadership team and convention hosts.

Those who are invited to give clinics or after-dinner talks at Regions other than their home Region cannot be expected to cover their own major expenses, including transportation, lodging, and banquet costs. They should expect to cover their own non-banquet meals, tours, and other extra-fare costs. But it is simply unfair to expect popular speakers to spend significant hobby funds to "entertain your troops," as they are often invited to numerous conventions each year. The costs quickly become prohibitive. The model railroad publications do have budgets for staff travel, but such budgets are usually very limited.

Many travel schedules and budgets are set up at least a year out; my own travel schedule tends to fill up two or three years in advance. So as soon as you have a date set for your event and a person delegated to round up a slate of clinicians and the after-dinner speaker, immediately reach out to those you hope can help you make your convention a resounding success.
