



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

Second place was a tie between Doug Wagner's N scale doodlebug, and John Stahl's HO 2-8-0 Consolidation, MDC Kit. John Stahl took third place with his HO model of SP 4-6-0 number 2334. Congratulations, and thanks to all those who entered locomotives.

Bob Sexton took first and second place with his Trains in Action entries. Vince Cody won third with a photo of the UP Challenger on a trestle.

Next Meet Categories

The model contest at the Goleta meet on August 27 will be Diesel and other locomotive. The PCR Contest Directory defines this as "All locomotives except steam or traction, including heavy electric locomotives. Entries must be powered; multiple-unit entries must have at least on unit powered." (The Division classifies all model contest entries as open, regardless of whether they are kit entries, novice, Teen or Youth. Judging is by popular vote.)

The photo contest will be Model, Black and White. The PCR Contest Directory defines this as "Black and White prints of model subjects." (Photo contest judging is by popular vote.)

Daylight Division was represented at the **Modesto Convention** contest, with our Superintendent Neil Fernbaugh taking third place in the Track and Structures Photo contest with his photo of the Starlight on Stenner Creek Trestle. Congratulations, Neil!

Remember that if you have a model to be judged for an Achievement Program Merit Award, even if it's still a work in progress, bring it along to Goleta and I will have a team of experienced modelers evaluate it for you. You might want us to have a preliminary look at it before you enter it at the Regional level next year in Bakersfield. A model brought for formal judging can be of any category.

Ladies and Gentlemen, our division has the honor of hosting the 2017 PCR Convention in Bakersfield, which means lots of opportunity to show the rest of the region that we have lots of modeling talent in the Valley and on the Coast. The Answers Are Out There:

Ultimate Minimalism

Model railroading forces us to do much with little. I would like to depict Southern Pacific, circa. 1948 from Dunsmuir,

CA to Portland, OR – about 450 miles of main line – in HO scale in my spare room. OK, so how about just Klamath Falls, OR to Chemult, OR, say 74 miles, using about 30 feet of track, or about one-half scale mile? I settled on modeling a small part of one end of a railyard like that at KFalls, a small town with a siding and a few spurs, and a short section of single track main joining those two. Tack on stub-ended staging at each end and that's my railroad. That will have to stand in for all of the glorious mainline railroading in western Oregon just after WWII.

Of course, that's not all of the minimizing we model railroaders do. Most model structures must be selectively compressed from prototype dimensions in order to fit our limited space, and I do the same with steam locomotives, in deference to the unrealistically tight curve radii we must employ. Instead of the Mountains (4-8-2's) and Decks (2-10-2's) the SP assigned to haul their lengthy consists, I run SP's equally handsome Pacifics (4-6-2's) and Mikes (2-8-2's) to pull much-abbreviated varnish and drags.

Lance Mindheim is a master of minimalism who designs layouts with excellent operating and scenic potential despite their having few turnouts and short main lines. Check out his website at shelflayouts.com. I highly recommend all of his books on small layout design and construction. In the May, 2013 issue of Model Railroad Hobbyist, Mr. Mindheim proposed the ultimate in minimal modeling: a fully scenicked and operational layout with but one turnout. His one turnout accesses a spur serving a single industry (a bakery) featuring about ten spots for freight cars.

Ultimate Minimalism

I intend to demonstrate the validity of his thesis that such a stand-alone layout is easy to build quickly and inexpensively, provides great opportunity for craftsman projects, and, most importantly, offers unlimited diverse, engrossing, and satisfying 20- to 60-minute solo operating sessions. Just the ticket to help one relax at the end of a stressful day!

The photo shows my progress to date on the bench work for my one-turnout layout. I chose to make it small and light in order to be portable, as I hope to unveil it at the 2017 PCR convention in Bakersfield. Three sections, each measuring 9 inches wide and 48 inches long, were constructed in the form of H-beams, using 1/4-inch thick plywood as the web and 1/8-inch hardboard (white "panelboard" from Lowe's) as flanges and fascia, all in one.

Over the course of the next few months, I plan to weather and install the track, wire for DCC with NCE PowerCab, paint a backdrop on three 16"x 48" sections of the white panelboard, create plaster-free terrain with red rosin paper and white glue, and build and install a few structures and several trees. The industry I've chosen to model is a cannery, which will consist of a minimum-depth backdrop building close to six actual feet long and featuring six or seven freight car spots. I have my work cut out.

NMRA Achievement Program

Association Volunteer

In this installment, we will briefly review the requirements for the Association Volunteer certificate. I say "briefly" because there are so many ways to complete the requirements for this certificate, too many to list here. For the full requirements, go to the NMRA webpage http://www.nmra.org/volunteer. You can also get a copy of the requirements by contacting me by phone, e-mail,



or letter. Also see the *Scale Rails*, November 2008 issue, page 18, for a very informative article describing the requirements and many examples of how to earn this certificate.

The Association Volunteer certificate, as its name implies, is to recognize an individual's volunteer service at the national, regional, or division level. There is only one requirement, two counting the paperwork, to qualify for this certificate; you must have served long enough to accumulate 60 time units (TUs) in "active satisfactory service" in various activities. The "TU" is the basic credit earned for various volunteer activities.

Some TUs are given for each month served in a position, while others are given for each activity. Serve on a convention committee? Get TUs for each month served. Work one day at a convention? Get TUs for one month. Give a clinic at a meet or convention? Get TUs for each presentation. Open your home or club layout for layout tours? Get TUs for each day. Judge a model contest? Get TUs for the day. You're a Boy Scout Railroading Merit Badge counselor? Get TUs for each month served, PLUS each Scout that qualifies for the badge. Different numbers of TUs are awarded depending on whether the activity is at the national, regional, or division level.

Please note that these TUs are in addition to any TUs received for being on the committee that works to set up the event! TUs may be earned concurrently for each qualified activity you perform. The more involved you are, the faster you accrue TUs! Be sure to check the full requirements

at www.nmra.org/volunteer to see how many TUs are accrued for each of the volunteer activities. Sometimes you can get credit for two different AP certificates, too. Giving a live clinic earns points toward the Model Railroad Author Certificate the first time it is presented, while all subsequent presentations earn Association Volunteer TUs.

KEEP TRACK OF YOUR SER-VICE AS YOU DO IT! Nobody except you will track the TUs you accrue.

AP - Volunteer

Go to www.nmra.org/volunteer and print out either the Statement of Qualifications (SOQ) or Record and Validation Form to list your volunteer activities and have it signed to verify your service as it happens. It is much easier to do it as you earn it, rather than going back and collecting signatures later when you're ready to apply for your certificate. Have someone in charge of the event sign your form to verify your service.

The final requirement for this certificate is the usual dreaded paperwork. You must submit a completed Statement of Qualification (SOQ) form, itemizing evidence of completion of the requirements. Along with your SOQ and Record and Validation Form, send a copy of your NMRA membership card, to the PCR AP Manager, Jack Burgess.

Does 60 TUs seem like a lot of work? Remember that past service can be claimed retroactively. Look back and take credit for any service you performed in the past while a NMRA member. 



Karl Busch, having organized the breakfast, was designated the "Biggest Bum", and adopted the name "T. Russ Rod".

The purpose of the Hobos is to encourage and recognize attendance at model railroad conventions, particularly National Conventions. A Hobo goes to conventions for the fun of it, no matter what the program may be. The Hobo group neither supports nor opposes causes or positions. The "group attention" is focused on convention participation and fun.

Hobo membership results to the Region Member attending an out of the region National Convention.

The Hobos are a REGIONAL activity and the "Official Event" is the HOBO BREAKFAST at the Annual Regional Convention.

Through the NMRA there are model railroaders who are members of our Region, in addition to their home Region. THE PCR HOBOS FOUNDED 1961

At the Hobo group Breakfast of 1964, Paul Shimada assumed the title of "Official Beggar" and collected the Hobo's pennies, stating, "For the postage, decals, ribbons and pins. All of which have been supplied at no cost to Hobos". 'T. Russ Rod' accepted the pennies, provided he did "not have to limit supplies to the amount received, or count it, or account for it". This collection has become 'traditional' and is the only source of revenue to cover the costs of planning and preparing for the Hobo Breakfast, or other Hobo items and events.

In 1982, the boundaries of the Pacific Coast Region were changed to include only the five northern divisions, Coast, Daylight, Redwood Empire, Sierra, and Hawaiian, of California and Hawaii. The Cajon, Los Angles, San Diego and Arizona Divisions became the new Pacific Southwest Region.

In conformance with the basic principles stated above, "The Hobo group neither supports nor opposes causes or positions"; the Hobos are a group affected by the change, not a participant in making the change.

Since the Hobo membership has been Region-wide, there was no fair way to allot the organization to one of these Regions, and create a new organization in the other Region. Nor, should one Region have sole claim to the Hobo name.

The Hobo idea originated with T. Russ Rod, in San Diego, in the Southern part of the PCR The founding Breakfast was held in Sacramento, in the Northern part of the PCR, as an accident of convention scheduling, pre-dating the event,

Whatever precedent these elements may be thought to have, regarding a claim on the organization, or the Hobo name, they are not to be considered. The name "Hobo" stays with the members in both Regions. The "herald" remains the same color for both Regions. The Region designation is the only difference in the two heralds.

The "Hobo History" and "Hobo Breakfast Guide" are on file with the Region Secretaries and the Division Superintendents.

UP No. 844 moved under her own power

June 17, 2016, Bruce A. Daugherty

CHEYENNE, Wyo. Working toward returning their much loved 4-8-4 to the high iron, the Union Pacific steam crew test fired No. 844 after a lengthy rebuild, sources in Wyoming tell *Trains* News Wire.

No. 844 built up steam pressure and moved back and forth just outside the shop, blowing out dirt and scale from the cylinder cocks. Ahead is additional work, installation of the jacketing and lagging, and a test run in advance of the July 23 Denver Post Frontier Days Special between Denver and Cheyenne.

No. 844, the last new steam locomotive built for the UP in 1944 and categorized as "never retired" since 1962, has been out of service since 2013. After working to fix a problem with over-rolled tubes, the crew decided to complete a 1,472-day inspection on the locomotive. After opening up the engine, additional work was necessary, and in between all of this, UP acquired Big Boy No. 4014 and gave the Cheyenne shop a makeover. *From Trains Magazine*

The Youngster Challenge

I occasionally hear that the NMRA seems unresponsive and does not change quickly. The reality is that we do tend to be slow to change or adapt and seem almost paralyzed at times. The NMRA has never been fast

moving nor does it embrace change quickly. Sometimes that can be good as it prevents over-reacting to flash-in-the-pan events but bad if it prevents us from adjusting to major shifts in demographics.

For example, what is our ability to adapt, change and appeal to younger generations? This issue poses challenges that can be difficult to meet. Part of the problem lies in the comfortable nature of doing what has historically worked well although there is ample evidence it no longer is effective. Holding "meets" and convening the same clique of now-seniors doing the same thing year after year may appeal to those in the clique or in their age group, but not to those outside the NMRA or in younger generations.

Here is the dilemma that is not easily resolved. As a member-driven hobby organization, to whom do we owe loyalty? "Do we owe loyalty to our existing members who are quite happy with our current programs and approach? Or do we owe loyalty to those younger nonmembers who represent our future and expect major changes in how we operate?" For unlike previous generations, the newest generations seem not interested in the NMRA as presently structured and formulated. That is not the opinion of me as a senior citizen; it is the opinion, as I interpret it, of almost all of the studies and articles done on the newest generations.

And this is not youngster bashing!! Far from it; the younger generations are our future. Also, not all of the younger generations are the same. *Gen X/Y* differ from *Millennials* but much of what we currently offer is of limited interest to some in those generations. So, we must discuss what we offer those younger generations realistically.

Just recently, I saw a story about a fraternal organization facing the same challenges as we do. That story related that younger generations did not want to join that fraternal organization, which they perceived a bunch of

NS, CSX confirm further cuts

Speed reductions, jobs, and yard operations in the works for the two eastern Class I railroads

June 9, 2016, By Bill Stephens

Norfolk Southern and CSX made additional cost-cutting moves this week as they aim to offset the steady and continued loss of highly profitable coal traffic.

NS has reduced the maximum authorized speed on several secondary routes across its system as part of its plan to downgrade, sell, or short-line 1,000 miles of track.

NS confirmed that it had reduced the maximum authorized speed on several secondary routes this week. But a railroad representative was unable to provide specifics. The speed reductions are "one of the options we are using across our network to reduce costs while not impacting service," NSTM Susan Terpay says.

Speed on the affected routes has dropped to 25 mph, generally from 40 mph. The change from Federal Railroad Administration Class 3 track to Class 2 will reduce maintenance costs.

CSX, meanwhile, announced it would virtually shut down its Winston Yard in Lakeland, Fla., to consolidate its operations in the Tampa area. CSX officials met with Winston Yard employees on Monday to inform them the yard's operations would be reduced and its car shop shuttered. Winston's locomotive shop will remain in service.

irrelevant older folks with whom they could not relate. Now think of your last Regional or Divisional meet/event. Same folks?

So what are we to do to reach out to them? Based on the studies, which we have reviewed, in many ways we know what changes must be made to our organization to make it appeal to a broader mass of those younger generations. First, the NMRA must substantially reduce its cost of membership. In fact, free would be ideal. Secondly, we must offer exclusive features and content appealing to those generations. Third, we must emphasize the hobby in ways that are very different than we are used to in practicing the hobby, especially in technical areas. It goes without saying that going digital is a must. The result would be a major change to the structure and function of the NMRA.

Some urge us to change to meet the expectations of those younger generations. But in so doing, we could alienate and lose a significant number of existing members. That is the dilemma. Do we make the changes we know would work and appeal to younger generations at the expense of alienating and losing a substantial percentage of existing members? That is the problem we face. I think it merits a heartfelt and soul-searching discussion by all of us.

Not that we are without tools within the present structure. The NMRA is the proper organization to encourage and train beginners to our hobby. We decided we have a role to play in this area but also decided not to compete with Kalmbach or WGH, organizations doing a wonderful job of both attracting and educating beginners. Another possible approach is the "Maker Faires" that have become increasingly popular with younger generations. Maker Faires are events where a range of technical fields is demonstrated often with hands-on examples for audience participation.. I think the NMRA must become more involved in Maker Faires and sponsor a program allowing us to participate in those Faires on an organized basis.

A proposal with great merit is to establish a mentoring program for interested youngsters. Of course, a mentor program can be a most effective way to get younger members to into our organization. But it is also an approach that must be carefully structured in an era of paranoia about older adults interacting with youngsters. One approach, as done in other parts of the world, is to pair a mentor with a close relative of the youngster to ensure the mentoring is done within family boundaries. Finally, we could start a new parallel digital organization affiliated with the NMRA that meets the needs of the younger generations. However, are we the right group to do so and why wouldn't someone of that generation start their own group if there were really a need for one?

The move, effective Saturday, will result in abolishing 80 jobs, including 76 union and four management positions. "The majority of them are expected to find other opportunities at CSX facilities in the greater Tampa area," CSX representative Melanie Cost says.

Most of Winston Yard's local service and switching duties will be handled at Yeoman Yard in Tampa. Operations at Mulberry and Auburndale yards also will be affected, CSX says, and some through trains running in and out of the Tampa area will be combined.

"The Tampa region is a strong revenue generator for CSX, but it is served by multiple yards with a large cost structure. In evaluating the region's operations, we saw an opportunity to significantly lower costs while continuing to provide safe, reliable service to all of our local customers served by Tampaarea crews," Chief Operating Officer Cindy Sanborn wrote in an email to employees.

NS leased 309 miles of its mothballed West Virginia Secondary in Ohio and West Virginia to Watco May. The shortline railroad conglomerate is expected to begin operating the route in July as the Kanawha River Railroad.

Both NS and CSX have taken steps to streamline operations this year as coal traffic plummets.

NS aims to achieve \$200 million in cost and productivity savings this

Education Services at the Division Level

As you probably know, the NMRA is a 501 (C) (3) nonprofit educational organization. Clearly the various programs and services that fall under the Education Department are essential to earning and keeping this designation. Let me quickly summarize those programs and services that fall under the umbrella. In no particular order they are: the Contest Program; the Achievement Program, the Modeling with the Masters Program; the EduTRAIN® Clinic Program; the Boy Scout Merit Badge Program; the SIG Programs; the Data Sheet Program and finally, the beginners section of the NMRA website. That is a rather large umbrella!

The actual implementation of these Educational Programs occurs in various ways at the National, Regional, and Divisional levels of our three-tiered organization. But the focus of this particular column is what these educational services might actually look like at the Division level. As you look around at all the Divisions, you will see a lot of variability. Some Divisions have an active Boy Scout Program while others do not. Many incorporate one or more clinics into every event they schedule, while others might only do that at what they call "Mini-Conventions". The Achievement Program certainly depends heavily on active promotion at the Division level and most Divisions make provisions at their event to both evaluate models and publicly present earned certificates within the AP Program. Although most Divisions do not regularly schedule formal Model Contests, many do incorporate Popular Vote Contests as a regular feature of their events. And on it goes.

Up until now, the only way one Division might learn what other Divi-


sions are doing was by perusing the on-line newsletters of other Divisions, most of which are available through links under the Regions & Divisions tab on the NMRA's website, or by actually attending the events of neighboring Divisions. Now there is another way. The Officers and Board of Directors asked for the development of a Division Superintendents' Handbook. This Handbook was presented to them in February at their Mid-Year Meeting in Atlanta.

This new Handbook contains a wealth of information useful to Division Superintendents/Presidents and others in leadership positions at the Division level. Included in that information is a collection of 'best practices' from Divisions around the NMRA and many of those best practices focus on

the delivery of the educational services and programs mentioned above.

The Handbook will soon be emailed to all Region Superintendents by Steve August, our RAC Director. He will ask that the Regions forward the Handbook to all their Division Superintendents.

The Handbook will also be available on the NMRA website in the Member's Only side of the site.

year, while CSX is shooting for \$250 million.

So far this year NS has shut down the hump yard at Knoxville, Tenn., reduced switching operations at 25 smaller yards across the system, combined its Virginia and Pocahontas divisions, and reduced its operating regions from three to two.

CSX has reduced operations at 17 lower-volume car shops system wide and reduced its number of operating divisions from 10 to nine.

CSX also said it was eliminating 39 mechanical and eight engineering positions system wide.

Both railroads are expected to take additional steps to bring costs in line with revenue.

South Coast Railroad Museum to Combine Railroad and Depot Days Into One Weekend Celebration.

Two fun-filled days of trains and railroad action await visitors to the South Coast Railroad Museum over the weekend of Aug. 20-21, 2016. Two of the museum's most popular annual family events, Goleta Rail-
