Layout Tour A: Central Valley Model Works, 1203 Pike Lane, Oceano - 1:00 to 3:00 PM.

This HO layout was built by the late Jack Parker, owner of Central Valley Model Works. It is now operated by his son, Jeff, and Jeff's wife, Heather. It represents the Northern Pacific in Montana in the era from the early 1940s to the early 1960s. The often photographed scenes depict Logan, Montana. While considerable "artistic license" has been taken with the actual arrangement of Logan, the layout allows the simulation of the actual operation of Northern Pacific trains going to and from St. Paul and Tacoma.

The layout room is a generous 17' x 50', plus an extra eight foot extension on the east end for return loops. The track is, of course, Central Valley CVT. That product was designed and developed for and then used on this layout. Jack's good friend and fellow NP model railroader David Coster helped design the layout and also did all of the wiring.

The layout features great roster of detailed brass steam locomotives and these all are tuned and weighted to pull scale-length trains. Central Valley Model Works website: http://www.cvmw.com/

Layout Tour B: Central Coast Model Railroad, San Luis Obispo Railroad Museum, 1940 Santa Barbara Ave, San Luis Obispo - until 4:00.

The Central Coast Model Railroad occupies a 1500 square foot space in the San Luis Obispo Railroad Museum. The HO scale model represents various aspects of railroad life in San Luis Obispo and northern Santa Barbara counties, including the geographical area, industries served, and train operations of the various railroads located there. A double-deck peninsula layout is utilized with realistic miniature recreations of up to 16 historic local railroad scenes along the Central Coast.

Trains incorporate sound and radio control operations to present a realistic presentation of railroading along the Central Coast.

Operationally, there are full-length passenger trains, including the colorful and renowned streamlined Daylight, the Lark and mail trains. Freight trains are shipping local produce, lumber, beets, oil and general merchandise. A maintenance of way train is also included.

Major features include the Pacific Coast Railway pier at Avila, San Luis Obispo, as a railroad division point incorporating the roundhouse, water tanks, the station with adjacent historic buildings, the Stenner Creek trestle and famous horseshoe curve.

The Southern Pacific Coast Line in HO scale is a two-level layout that will ultimately have a mainline run of over 500 lineal feet.

We currently have 240 feet of the lower level now in operation. The Surf Depot area and the bridge crossing the Santa Ynez River are complete. The Stenner Creek Trestle (eight actual feet in length) is built and installed. Track is laid for the San Luis Obispo yard, which is eight tracks wide and thirty feet in length. Many of the historic structures are in place. Where possible, all the scenes are based upon actual SP track plans and 1950s era photographs.

The Pacific Coast Railway in HOn3 model currently includes Avila Beach and the Harford Pier (nearly 16 feet in length), a four-foot high painted backdrop of the harbor area, and the town of Avila Beach in the early 1930s, including the award-winning wood truss bridge over San Luis Obispo Creek. This portion of the layout was featured on the cover of the September 2012 issue of Railroad Model Craftsman.

There is an admission fee: Members, free; Adult, \$3; Child (4-15), \$2; Child (3 and under), free.

Layout Tour C: Los Osos Valley Railroad (HO) and the D & P Mountain Railroad, Paul Deis, Paso Robles - until ?

Paul will open his layouts (yes, more than one!) to us - his outdoor garden railroad and indoor Southern Pacific layouts, the Los Osos Valley Railroad (HO) and the D & P Mountain Railroad (Fn3) Garden Railroad.

The Los Osos Valley Railroad is an HO scale 400 sq. foot double-deck, point to point layout. It represents the Southern Pacific Coast Line from San Luis Obispo to San Miguel in 1949. The layout is designed for operations and features hand-laid track, NCE DCC and sound equipped locomotives. Both ends of the layout have off-layout staging areas. Trackwork is 70% complete. Some scenery is started.


The D & P Mountain Railroad is Paul's freelanced Fn3 (1:20.3 scale) garden railroad. This is an L-shaped design and operates around 2 sides of Paul's house. There is a 350 foot mainline and 150 feet of sidings and industry spurs. The maximum grade is four percent with ten-foot minimum diameter curves. The entire railroad is raised off the ground. The D & P Mountain Railroad is based on Colorado Mountain railroading with mining and lumber operations in the 1940s era. Locomotives are battery powered with radio control, QSI sound decoders and Airwire throttles.

Driving Directions to Meet: From the South:

Drive North on US-101 and take Exit #182 / Los Berros Rd / Thompson Rd, go 0.3 miles, Turn Left on Los Berros Rd, go 4.7 miles, Turn Left on Valley Rd, go 0.4 miles, Turn Right on Cienaga St (Hwy 1) go 2.1 miles and the Oceano Depot will be on your left.

From the North:

Drive South on US-101 from San Luis Obispo and take the Hwy 1/Pismo Beach exit. Stay on Hwy 1 South thru Pismo Beach for 3.5 miles. After you cross the UP tracks on a bridge, the Oceano Depot will be on your right.

A big Daylight thanks to Bruce Morden for coordinating our August May 27th meet in Goleta at the South Coast Railroad Museum. Good job, Bruce!




Our next meet is on November 19th at the historic SP

What a fun piece of history Buying a watch in 1880

If you were in the market for a watch in 1880, would you know where to get one?

You would go to a store, right? Well, of course you could do that, but if you wanted one that was cheaper and a bit better than most of the store watches, you went to the train station!

Sound a bit funny?

Well, for about 500 towns across the northern United States, that's where the best watches were found.

Why were the best watches found at the train station?

The railroad co. wasn't selling the watches, not at all. The telegraph operator was. Most of the time the telegraph operator was located in the railroad station because the telegraph lines followed the railroad tracks from town to town. It was usually the shortest distance and the right-of-ways had already been secured for the rail line.

Most of the station agents were also skilled telegraph operators and it was the primary way they communicated with the railroad. They would know when trains left the previous station and when they were due at their next station. And it was the telegraph operator who had the watches. As a matter of fact, they sold more of them than almost all the stores combined for a period of about 9 years.

This was all arranged by "Richard", who was a telegraph operator himself. He was on duty in the North Redwood, Minnesota train station one day when a load of watches

My apologies for being so often MIA. I had committed some time ago to helping with a rewrite of our bylaws, and I've attached my suggestions. See pages 16-20. In this newsletter I have included the Bylaws suggestions and a discussion of the bylaws. Please review and comment. Otherwise, I think the next way forward is a few rounds of emails. I will again send the bylaws proposal and comments in a separate email. Please pass them on to anyone you think is interested that I haven't copied.

Here are some random thoughts to create some excitement at our meets events:

Last year at Oceano we had a good selection of structures to share, George G. suggested that we might try buying, or having our members buy, several copies of a specific kit, say a DPM, Monster Model Works, or Bar Mills starter kit, and ask members to build their "version" of the same structure, kit-bashing, weathering, or painting it to each members fancy, then sharing them in a special contest or display. If we bought the kits and had our members assemble them, we might sell them as a fund-raiser at a meet, or at a regional convention.

In Exeter last year, Brewster cooked a Railroad breakfast for us. His suggestion that we have a clinic on Railroad food seemed interesting. I wonder if we could find a chef to create a convention banquet, or a lunch at a meet where a specific menu from the Daylight or San Francisco Chief might serve as the basis for a meal.

A lot of comments have been floating around about naming our 2017 Convention. I'm sure some of you still have ideas to contribute. The name chosen is – Daylight Express 2017. Thanks for all the ideas offered. Some other names offered were "The Eastside Lines, Kern Junction, The Valley Lines." Then some of the train names used in the valley were offered - "The Sunset Manifest, Sunset Express, West Coast Limited, the Gold Coast, and the Expediter." Also offered were names associated with operations - "Car Cards, Flimsies, and Switchlists." Now that is being creative, not this time usable but still creative.

One interesting thought came out of the discussions. It was the idea of using something along the lines of "The Orange Belt." In addition to describing our eastside valley lines, and being my favorite modeling locale, most of you will remember that the local bus line that served railroad stations along the San Joaquin Valley was the Orange Belt Stages. Since Athearn put out a bus model that matches the old buses they used, and because I am sure that the management of the bus lines would not object, we could ask Athearn to make a custom painted model of the bus and use it as a convention car. I talked with both the bus line owner, and Athearn a few years ago, and they were interested. It might make an interesting fundraiser for the division if featured in MR as a "club car."

Buy a Watch

arrived from the East. It was a huge crate of pocket watches. No one ever came to claim them.

So Richard sent a telegram to the manufacturer and asked them what they wanted to do with the watches. The manufacturer didn't want to pay the freight back, so they wired Richard to see if he could sell them. So Richard did.

He sent a wire to every agent in the system asking them if they wanted a cheap, but good, pocket watch.

The business took off and soon expanded to many other lines of dry goods. Richard and Alvah left the train station and moved their company to Chicago -- and it's still there.

YES, IT'S A LITTLE KNOWN FACT that for a while in the 1880's, the biggest watch retailer in the country was at the train station. It all started with a telegraph operator: **Richard SEARS** and his partner **Alvah ROEBUCK**!

The first is from Brewster Bird:

Dear Daylighters and PCR folk, thanks for showing up at the Daylight meet in Goleta this past weekend. If not, you missed some great coffee from Coffeemicro a new roastery based in Visalia, a well done clinic from our host, Bruce Morden on timetable and train orders (TT & TO's) and a clinic on our upcoming regional convention in Bakersfield. After the two clinics, we featured a hobby roundtable spirited open discussion on the hobby and it's future. Also really thoughtful and well done layout tours!

The next is from Bruce Morden:

We had a really laid back Daylight Division event on Saturday. August 27. Bruce Morden had organized the meet which was held at the South Coast Railroad Museum at the Historic Goleta Depot, a 1901 Southern Pacific restored station structure. Fourteen were in attendance, including several non-members and a couple from out of the Division. There were no officers so there was no business meeting. There was home brewed coffee courtesy of Brewster Bird plus the usual fat pills [donuts]. No one brought any contest models or photos. Registration sign up and collection for lunch was quick.

After a few introductory remarks Bruce led us down to the Freight Office inside the Depot. With an authentic background Bruce gave a clinic on Timetable and Train Order Operations the way Southern Pacific did it. Included were actual dispatchers sheets from December 1963 and 1974 as well as the corresponding timetables in use for those months. Some actual train orders and clearances from the same time were shared as Bruce explained how the orders were conveyed to the operator at the depot and then transferred to the crews as they went by. Outside at trackside, we looked at the train order post and the train order boards which rose above the two story depot building itself.

The second clinic presented by Chris Palermo and Doug Wagner, cochairs for Daylight Express 2017, the PCR Regional convention in Bakersfield next year. They told us about the convention and some of the events being planned, including Michael Gross as speaker for the dinner. Mike O'Brien and Bruce Morden who are the conventions clinic cochairs also added to the discussion. The convention display board and brochures were on hand. There was an informal discussion of bringing younger people into the Division and model railroading in general.

We held the traditional white elephant auction as well as selling some donated items. There was no door prize. We enjoyed the pizza lunch and some stayed to ride the 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ inch gauge train at the museum. There were 9 layouts on the afternoon tour. All in all it was a very enjoyable day.

The following Daylight Division meet was August 27, at the Goleta Depot and hosted by the South Coast Railroad Museum. The meet coordinator, Bruce Morden, organized a terrific event. Goleta and Santa Barbara are ripe with fabulous layouts to visit.

Member Aid 52; The Answers Are Out There: **Placing Industries on a Shelf Layout**

Most industries served by model railroads are more believable when they dwarf the freight cars which are spotted at them for loading and unloading. Face it: a model of a box factory or woolen mill accommodating a single boxcar is just not convincing. On the other hand, we model railroaders almost never have enough space to put in an industry built to scale size. This was the quandary I faced as I designed Fall Creek Branch, intended to be a portable, stand-alone, switching layout. I needed (well, wanted very badly) to fit nine busy and realistic-looking industries, along with all the track serving them, into a space 15 inches wide and 8 feet long. Did I mention it was to be HO scale?

The solution I came up with was to situate the main line 10 inches back from the front fascia. This allowed me to put complete buildings in front of the main and still have room at the back for minimum-depth structures against the 18-inch tall, painted hardboard backdrop. Two spurs in front of the main track serve five industries which were carefully chosen to be generally low and/or see-through. Only a two-story hardware store blocks the operator's view of the track behind. Moreover, except for the hardware store, these rail customers are basically transfer points where trucks bring merchandise to be shipped or where they haul merchandise away and thus can legitimately be both busy and small in size.

Two more spurs behind the main line serve four industries with much larger footprints: a furniture factory, a grain elevator complex, a cannery, and a sash and door mill. They are modeled by seven mostly tall buildings, each only a few inches deep. Each of these four rail customers takes between three and five car lengths of spur track and, by standing several stories high, appears massive enough to require frequent rail service.



The photo of Fall Creek Co-Op shows this complex of three low-relief structures as seen through and over the Klamath Fruit loading shed. The Co-Op consists of the front halves of Walthers #3036 Farmers Cooperative Grain Elevator (and storage building) and Campbell #449

Grain Storage Bin. Klamath Fruit is a mashup of Northeastern #40020 Transfer Station and BTS #27800 Covered Wood Rick.

A EUREKA Moment **Static Grass Applicators** Posted by: George Gibson

I believe I posted previously that I was not truly thrilled with the results of my 'flyswatter' nor my Ion Generator based static grass applicators. I wasn't really thrilled with the performance of the Noch 'Grass Master' either. Additional review of the *YouTube* "How To ..." videos and a passing comment I picked up somewhere made me try a different design approach on the applicator.

The key to this new design is the fact the hopper screen material is PLASTIC (not a metal tea strainer), and the positive charge is placed in the REAR of the hopper (much like the Noch unit). I used a piece of "Bonsai Tree drainage screen" for my screen material, and I built up a positive discharge plate from a piece thin aluminum and a 1" long machine screw, 1/4" in diameter. Both the plastic screen and the positive discharge plate were epoxied in place. Using a 12 vdc Ion Generator as my static power source, I went back to the same testing parameters I used before: white foam core board, Elmer's white glue and some white glued mixed with water 1:1, and the same grounding pin. I held the hopper about 1 inch above the surface as before. I used both 2 mm and 6 mm grass for a direct comparison with the tests done before.

Turning on the power and giving the hopper a little shake provided immediate results that were far superior to anything I had done before. The majority of the grass was standing vertical and there was very little product wasted

Placing Industries

The photo of the west end of Fall Creek shows the sash and door mill-the large red building with three gabled dormer windows and adjoining boiler house at the far left, both built scratch from against the backdrop. In front of these imposing (half-) structures is




the busy team track area, featuring an end-loading ramp, transfer platform, and bridge crane (from Walthers #4048 Piggyback Ramps). None of these latter features hide or restrict access to the tracks and buildings behind.

Not shown in the photos is the east end of Fall Creek, where a spur at the front serves an oil distributor and a cattle pen with loading ramp. Neither of these industries interferes with an operator's view of or access to the three-story tall American Furniture Factory (Blair Line #192 Warehouse Backdrop Building) situated behind them against the backdrop.

Most of us model railroaders need huge industries to ship and receive the loads in those scores of freight cars we pick up and set out every time we run trains. I implore you not to make do with a tiny brewery or minuscule refinery when you can build an enormous one easily, inexpensively, and relatively quickly. Don't settle for a paper mill or automotive assembly plant the size of a large boxcar when you can instead build one the size of a small city. You just have to remember to situate the bulk of it on the far side of your backdrop!

Static Grass Applicators

(as in not glued down vertically). I was having that "Eureka" moment and I was tickled pink with myself.

My unscientific conclusion is based on using the PLASTIC screen and placing the positive discharge point behind the screen, at the bottom of the hopper. The static field originates on the back plate, rather than on a metal screen, causing the static charge to "flow" through the plastic screen with static grass being picked up and 'shot' into the negatively charged area of glue. Or whatever. The results were definitely better and I'm giving credit to the PLASTIC screen and the re-located positive discharge point.

A photo comparison was hard to do, but an overhead shot is provided. This photo is with the 6 mm grass. I tried to use the same amount of grass and kept shaking the hopper until it was gone. You can plainly see the one on the left appears thicker. It was made with the plastic screened hopper. The one on the right was made with the metal screen. Both used a 12 vdc power supply and Ion Generator.


And here's a bonus I wasn't expecting . . . using a metal screen has the potential to contact the negative grounding pin/nail and it can give you that unexpected spark and pop when you get in too close to the work. This can't happen with a plastic screen and the positive charge being 3 to 4 inches away, inside the hopper.

My 'new' static grass applicator consists of an Ion Generator at \$14.99, a DPDT switch from my parts supply bin, a small project

NMRA Achievement Program Model Railroad Author Certificate

By David A. Grenier, Division AP Manager

In this installment we'll discuss the requirements for the Model Railroad Author certificate. There are basically two requirements:



Model Railroading

Prototype Railroading, Applicable to Modeling

NMRA Administration (e.g. Officers or Committee Reports)

Submit a Statement of Qualification.

The material being presented for consideration must be the work of the author, photographer, draftsman, artist, etc. A total of forty-two (42) points must be earned from a combination of material in four different areas.

The first area is Published Articles that appear in printed media, such as magazines or newsletters and may include text, photographs, drawings, etc. Material that has been published or accepted for publication may be claimed. A copy of the published material or the acceptance receipt from the publication must be submitted as proof. Points are awarded regardless of size or number of features appearing in any particular issue, per the following table.

Okay, now for some definitions. So what is a "page" anyway? A "page" is about 1,200 words and partial credit may be claimed for partial pages down to quarter pages. "NMRA Publications" (including SIG publications) with a circulation of more than 2,000 may be considered "National Publications", while those with a circulation of more than 1,000 may be considered "Region Publications". Materials published in 100% NMRA Club publications earn half the points as for an NMRA Division publication. *Continued on Next Page.*

box from Radio Shack at \$4.99, a plastic drinking glass, with lid, from the Dollar Store at \$1.00, a 12 vdc wall wart for \$5.00, and some miscellaneous wire, connectors, solder, etc. I like the idea of placing all of needed 'stuff' in the project box and having only the hopper in my hand when applying the grass. There's just one wire coming out of it, everything else is out of the way. Very easy to control and no added weight or bulk.

If more detail on the design or the construction is wanted, just ask. This new design works. Can't wait to start planting some grass on the layout. *(Sorry, no photos provided.)*

Author Certificate

Hey, that's great, you say. I've already written dozens of articles for the Division newsletter, so I'm all set. Not so fast there, Bunky. No more than half of the total required points (21) may be claimed for Division or 100% NMRA Club publications. It takes more than being a prolific author of the written word to qualify for the Model Railroad Author certificate. Keep reading.

This second area, Live Clinics, is for presenting a live clinic at conventions, Division meets, etc. To qualify for points, the clinic must be prepared and presented by the member applying for the certificate, it must be <u>at least 30 minutes in length</u>, and it must <u>include a handout</u>. A copy of the handout must be included with the certificate application. Points are awarded per the following table:



A live clinic can only be claimed for Model Railroad Author points once, even if it presented more than once. Additional presentations of a clinic earn credit towards the Association Volunteer certificate, per the following table.

If you have prepared and presented a clinic at a Division meet or convention sometime in the past, as long as it meets the above requirements, namely lasted at least 30 minutes and included a handout, it can still earn credits. Just add it to your "Record and Validation Form" with the appropriate information. (See Statement of Qualification below.)

The third area of materials is Instructional Video Tape and Multi-Media presentations. These are presentations that are specifically created by the member applying for the certificate using videotape or other multi-media. This production process will generally involve such things as preparing a shooting script or story board, creating close up shots to illustrate the material, etc. Simply having a live clinic video taped is not acceptable. If the presentation is not interactive (for example, a video tape), then it earns credit at the rate of 1/2 point per minute of the presentation. (30 minutes = 15 points!) If the presentation is interactive (requiring input from the viewer as it goes), then it earns credit as an "Electronic Publication", described below. To earn credit for an Instructional Video Tape or Multi-Media Presentation, it must be submitted to the Member Services Department Director for use by the Kalmbach Memorial Library, or directly to the NMRA AP Executive Vice Manager for evaluation. Include the letter of acceptance with the Author certificate application.

Author Certificate

The fourth area is Electronic Publications for materials published on a public electronic forum, such as the Internet. This material earns points at the same rate as Published Articles in Region Publications. All photos, drawings, etc. are treated as 1/3 of a page. Material published in more than one place, in a magazine and electronically or in multiple electronic formats, can only earn credit once. The address (URL) of the material must be included with the certificate application. If the material is published on a non-publicly accessible forum, such as a private BBS, it is not eligible for credit. No more than half of the total required points (21) may be claimed for Electronic Publications.

Final determination of what material is acceptable for credit, and how much credit it earns, lies with the NMRA AP Executive Vice Manager.

The final requirement for the Model Railroad Author category is to submit a Statement of Qualification (SOQ), with includes a list of all material claimed giving the subject matter, name of the publication or place of presentation, the dates, and the handouts. The number of points claimed for each item must be shown. Submit the completed SOQ to the Region AP Manager, Jack Burgess. (See PCR Callboard, www.pcrnmra.org, for his contact information)


The Model Railroad Author certificate will probably take you the longest to achieve, since writing takes time. (I know all too well from writing these articles!) It can also be a source of great pride seeing your name in print and maybe financially rewarding if your article gets published by one of the model railroad magazines. All I can say is "Go for it!" The upcoming Daylight Express 2017 PCR Convention in Bakersfield will give you a great start on the Model Railroad Author and Association Volunteer certificates if you present your clinic twice.





THE PCR HOBOS

As a result, it is not unusual to have a breakfast at a National Convention. All arrangements for such a breakfast are up to the people in attendance.

At the Hobo group Breakfast of 1964, Paul Shimada assumed the title of "Official Beggar" and collected the Hobo's pennies, stating, "For the postage, decals, ribbons and pins. All of which have been supplied at no cost to Hobos". 'T. Russ Rod' accepted the pennies, provided he did "not have to limit supplies to the amount received, or count it, or account for it". This collection has become 'traditional' and is the only source of revenue to cover the costs of planning and preparing for the Hobo Breakfast, or other Hobo items and events.


In 1982, the boundaries of the Pacific Coast Region were changed to include only the five northern divisions, Coast, Daylight, Redwood Empire, Sierra, and Hawaiian, of California and Hawaii. The Cajon, Los Angles, San Diego and Arizona Divisions became the new Pacific Southwest Region.

In conformance with the basic principles stated above, "The Hobo group neither supports nor opposes causes or positions"; the Hobos are a group affected by the change, not a participant in making the change.

Since the Hobo membership has been Region-wide, there was no fair way to allot the organization to one of these Regions, and create a new organization in the other Region. Nor, should one Region have sole claim to the Hobo name.

The Hobo idea originated with T. Russ Rod, in San Diego, in the Southern part of the PCR The founding Breakfast was held in Sacramento, in the Northern part of the PCR, as an accident of convention scheduling, pre-dating the event,

Whatever precedent these elements may be thought to have, regarding a claim on the organization, or the Hobo name, they are not to be consid-



ered. The name "Hobo" stays with the members in both Regions. The "herald" remains the same color for both Regions. The Region designation is the only difference in the two heralds.

The "Hobo History" and "Hobo Breakfast Guide" are on file with the Region Secretaries and the Division Superintendents.

A few words from the President About Caboose Hobbies



The news of Caboose Hobby's imminent closing hit like a thunderbolt. This Denver train shop was more than a hobby shop catering to model railroaders; it was a seminal destination for generations of hobbyists.

Started in 1938 by Glenn Brazelton and originally located downtown on 15th street, Caboose quickly became

identified with a large inventory and excellent service. Son Duane Miller and wife Joanna took over, expanded and moved when the old location could not handle the increasing inventory. Their new location on South Broadway was the size of a supermarket, complete with shopping carts, and quickly became a "must" stop for visitors. Certified by Guinness as the World's Largest Train Store, Caboose became known for its staggering inventory, inspiring store layouts and dioramas, and brass case with hundreds of pieces. It offered clinics and seminars, carried a wide range of magazines and books, and a massive inventory in all scales. If Caboose did not have it, it did not exist. Over the decades, Caboose also expanded its mail order and internet presence until fully half of its sales were internet originated.

A changing hobby business and a landlord who wanted to sell the building for a major redevelopment meant the Millers had to either move or close. Originally, they chose to downsize and move to a smaller location but after such a long time in the business, Duane and Joanna decided to close up and call it an era. And it truly was; stories of first visits to Caboose are legion and often very similar. As many times as I have been there, Caboose was not to be taken lightly. The more you looked, the more you found. I never was able to visit without getting *something*, and often, to Margaret's horror, many *somethings*! But always they were wonderful items at fair prices and often products you did not find elsewhere.

Now Denver is left without a major train shop, although there are some excellent smaller shops in town including a favorite of mine that specializes in used equipment. Colorado Springs still has two major shops left but that is a one hour drive south. Regardless, I wish the Millers well and thank them for all of the wonderful years they gave us. Classy folks. Hopefully, another shop will provide train equipment to the many modelers in the Denver metro area.

Did you notice that the 2017 Walthers catalog combines HO-N-Z in one volume? Some may celebrate this as it presents more scale options, but this also is another example of the contraction of the hobby. There simply is not enough product to justify two catalogs, as in past years. Walthers, like Caboose, is a seminal part of the hobby industry and while far from closing, is an example of changes in the industry.

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Summary of the Board of Directors Meeting

Please note that this is an unofficial summary of what took place at the BOD meeting in Indianapolis last July. The official minutes, authored by secretary John Stevens, will appear on the NMRA website, <u>www.nmra.org</u>.

Member Discount Program - A draft letter soliciting hobby shops to join the program has been prepared and is under review. In addition, a list of talking points for members to use while discussing the program with hobby shop owners is in the works. Plans are for RAC Director Steve August to send these materials to Region Presidents for distribution to Divisions, and ultimately to members.

The Layout Visitation Directory group has completed a large survey of layout owners listed in the former Pike Registry. The survey focused on visitation problems and issues. The group also solicited input from selected NMRA members as to what should be included in the online Directory and how that content should be displayed. The group is currently consulting with the NMRA web development staff.

After making significant progress with the California State Railroad Museum (CSRM) regarding the "Magic of Scale Model Railroading" display, the person in charge was reassigned to a different job. President Charlie Getz has met with the new CSRM point person and has received positive feedback. He reports that it appears that the display will be moving forward sometime this year.

The IRS has rejected the initial application for a unified 501(c)(3) classification for the test Region and Division. The NMRA has asked a law firm for advice on how to adjust the application to get it through the IRS.

The Board decided to retain the former "Pike Registry" under the name of "Layout Registry." More will be announced in the coming months.

After not having a price increase for *NMRA Magazine* subscriptions since 2012, the Board passed a motion to adjust subscription rates, effective October 1, 2016, to reflect the actual cost of delivering printed magazines to members in the various major geographies. Renewals due between now and October 1, 2016 will be charged at the current rate; renewals after that date will be charged at the new rate. The price increases are as follows:

Increase US subscriptions to \$28 USD from \$22 USD

Increase US student subscriptions to \$28 USD from \$22 USD

Increase the Canada subscription price to \$33 USD from \$17.50 USD

Adjust all International (non-USA and Canada) subscription rates to a uniform \$53 USD from the current range of \$53-58 USD.

Maintain the non-actuarial Life subscription draw at \$5.67 USD. Raise the actuarial Life member rates to \$28 USD, regardless of geography.

After hearing excellent presentations from both the British Region and the Australasian Region, the Board awarded the 2022 NMRA National Convention to the British Region. The last time the national convention was in Britain was 1971. The convention will be called "The Heart of England."

In addition to its usual business, the Board, Officers and Department heads participated in a SWOT (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, Threats) analysis to help with future planning. A Communications and Social Media Action Group was instituted to aid in setting strategies and tactics for electronic media. The group will suggest ways to help raise the profile of the NMRA, extend its reach to new demographics, and aid in communication.
