a lot over the past 50 years. My dad, my brother and I constructed an O tinplate railroad (complete with cardboard and cheese box buildings) in the basement after World War II. About 1950, I switched to HO when a neighbor schoolmate got some Varney kits and a dockside locomotive for Christmas. I marched right down to Hayward Drug Store to purchase two

Laconia and Megow kits for a combined cost of less than \$2. I scratch built other cars from card stock, tin cans and yardsticks. My first locomotive was a Mantua 0-4-0 shifter kit, which cost \$27.50 at Macy's.

The "art" of model railroading has changed dramatically over the past half century. Today's modeler has a wealth of exquisitely detailed railroad models available at the local hobby shop. Furthermore, NMRA established standards that enable us to run our equipment on each other's railroads. Digital command control (DCC) allows independent control of several locomotives on a given track segment. More recently, most manufacturers have produced ready-to-run sound-equipped locomotives.

Today, we build prototype railroads or incorporate prototype scenes within

our freelance designs. No longer do we settle for generic equipment and nondescript layouts. We now purchase locomotives and rolling stock detailed for a specific prototype. I am building a freelance bridge route between Cumberland, MD, and Parkersburg, WV. The new Freeborn and Western was formed in 1950 by the predecessor roads that now make up the CSX and Norfolk Southern. The operations plan

lets me to run most of the equipment I have acquired over the years.

I was one of more than 100 modelers, attending the joint Layout Design and Operations Special Interest Groups

(LD/Op SIGS) meet in Santa Clara, February 11, cosponsored by the PCR. We heard a series of informative, interesting presentations and panel discussions. Anyone planning or building a layout should attend the LD and OP SIGS events at the River City Express convention in Sacramento, Thursday, May 4. Bring your plans and let the experts answer your questions.

It seems that every month when I open the latest magazine or newsletter, I learn that another long-time friend has passed away. I was saddened to learn that PCR member Hal Riegger

MADE IN THE PCR

Rio Grande Models West Side Lumber Co. Structures

bout 4 ½ years ago I reviewed several Rio Grande Models HOn3 car kits, and in the interim I have completed a number of HO standard gauge cars from Rio Grande, which I will probably review at some time in the future. This review is of two structures from the West Side Lumber Company, which from my perspective is a departure from the company's previous concentration on details and rolling stock. The West Side is a popular

railroad among rail fans and modelers and there is a great deal of information as well as models in a number of scales for the West Side modeler Some of the reasons it is so popular are the railroad was one of the last to operate steam, was well documented in photographs and several great books, and because the company had a unique style; there are many pieces of rolling

stock and structures that are quintessential "West Side" - because the railroad continued to use equipment it

first acquired at the start (about 1900) and then built a lot of things to the companies own interesting designs.

While both of these buildings definitely scream "West Side" they would easily fit well into any logging/lumbering scene and look great. Both have character and both show the utilitarian nature of logging structures. Both of these kits

are available in HO, S and O, for this review I built the HO versions.

The first building is the West Side Dispatchers office (Kit #3108-DO). This building sat along the mainline leading to the woods and was where trains stopped on their way into the woods for their orders. The kit is composed of several frets of laser cut parts, laser cut window glazing and roofing material. There are eight pages of instructions and a sheet with photos of all the

parts with numbered callouts. The directions are very complete and the model goes together like a dream. I obtained a couple of color photos of the building and used that for my painting but Rio Grande's painting instructions closely follow what I did, which was to first stain all the wood with a fairly thin India Ink and Alcohol solution and then dry brush the final color leaving some gaps to show weathering of the paint. I

finished the roof with Bragdon's Weathering Powders. I love this little structure and found a place for it in my already crowed Tuolumne scene

The second kit is the car sprayer (kit #3110-CS). "The what?" you ask. The West Side had a platform and a high pressure nozzle and they would shoot water at the log cars as they entered the yard to clean off all

the woods debris. This is really two small details as it is both the platform and the petite valve house that supplied

the high pressure water stream. Again these are mostly laser cut wood parts that go together metal castings for the piping and spray assembly. I left this wood weathered, with blackened along side the track leading to

nicely along with well done valve in the pump house and the metal parts. And again, set these the woods.

The Dispatchers office sells for \$45.00 and the car sprayer is \$15.00. In addition, Rio Grande also produces the lumber company's warehouse #2 and meat shed as well as the watchman's shanty located at River Bridge. I'm thrilled with both kits and wish I had a spot for the other two structures. Yet again NMRA Past President and company owner Eric Bracher has provided several winners. ACHIEVEMENT PROGRAM

MODEL RAILROAD ENGINEER - CIVIL



In the Jul – Sept issue of the Branch Line, we talked about the requirements for the Master Builder – Scenery certificate. While scenery is basic to a layout, layout design and track are also fairly basic to a layout. The Model Railroad Engineer – Civil certificate has been developed to encourage and recognize those abilities associated with layout design and track construction.

There are four general requirements that need to be completed and/or demonstrated as part of the process of qualifying for this certificate.

The first is to prepare an original scale drawing of a model railroad track plan identifying overall size, scale, etc. The plan needs to be neat and legible, although it need not be in ink or drawn using a CAD program. (It is, however, suggested that you check the requirements for Model Engineer – Electrical and Chief Dispatcher before drawing this plan so that you can include the requirements for those certificates as part of the same effort.) You don't need to build everything included in the plan, but you do need to include a number of required features including adequate terminal facilities for handling freight and/or passenger cars, adequate facilities for storage and service of motive power, at least one passing track and four switching locations (not counting yards, interchanges, wyes, and reversing loops), provisions for turning motive power, and provisions for running at least two mainline trains in either direction. Again, remember that you don't need to necessarily build all of these items, just include them on your plan. If you are limited for space, you can design the layout that you want to build but only build what you have space for at the time.

The second general requirement is to construct and demonstrate the satisfactory operation of completed section of the model layout from this plan containing at least 25 linear feet of track in N, 50 linear feet in HO or S Scale, or at least 75 linear feet of track in O Scale. The track must be complete with ballast, drainage facilities, roadbed profile, etc. The track must include at least six different features such as a passing track, a spur, a cross-over, a turntable, etc. out of a possible 18 features.

The third general requirement is to scratch build three

track features and demonstrate their satisfactory operation. These features can include a turnout, crossover, crossing, etc. out of a possible 14 features. These track features do not need to be part of the layout but can be built on a separate piece of wood, as long as they are long enough to be able to be powered to demonstrate that a piece of motive power can run through them in all directions

The last general requirement is to win a Merit Award for the scratch-built track feature items listed under the last item. To win a Merit Award, you need only to demonstrate that the track features work satisfactorily and that workmanship is done neatly.

If you have completed all of these requirements, you submit a Statement of Qualifications (SOQ) along with a photocopy of your NMRA membership card and you are on your way toward another certificate!

Like many of the other AP categories, many of us have completed a majority of the requirements as part of our general approach to the hobby. Maybe you have built an HO layout with at least 50 feet of completed track that includes a passing track, a spur, a simple ladder yard, some track on a grade, a turntable, and a reversing loop. If so, you have met that requirement! Even if the plan that you used to build your layout doesn't include the features required under the first category, you could easily design and draw up a layout for a larger space that included the required features. That would satisfy the first requirement. If you scratch built (i.e., hand laid) some of the track components for your layout, you might only need to hand lay a couple more to meet the rest of the requirements. Hand laying track is really quite simple and you might be closer to receiving the Model Railroad Engineer - Civil than you think. If you are interested in pursuing this AP certificate, download them from the NMRA web page at www.nmra.org.

I am happy to announce that Seth Neumann has been awarded a certificate for Volunteer. Congratulations Seth!

In addition, Jack Verducci has been awarded an AP certificate for Master Builder – Motive Power. This

WHAT IS OUR PURPOSE?

was asked by one of the PCR Board of Directors to come up with one or two sentences that would state the purpose of our organizations, the NMRA, PCR and RED. Here are some of my thoughts.

One of the main reasons a modeler can buy pieces of the equipment from any American manufacturer, be they engines or cars, and run them together on any model railroad track is a thing called standards. Who came up with these standards? The NMRA, of which the PCR and RED are part, worked hard promoting uniform standards. The gauge of the track and wheels, how the cars are weighted, and the turnouts and their clearances are all part of these standards. More recently, all the work to make the DCC systems compatible with each other, were developed by the NMRA. A modeler can take any number of decoders from various manufacturers and use them on different systems. So would this be the primary reason for our organization to exist? There's more.

Today we have technology being offered to the modeler that we could only dreamed of less than ten years ago. I just came back from the Southern Pacific Historical & Technical Society convention in San Diego, where we were operating one of the new Broadway Limited SP AC-4 Cab Forwards on our club modules. This engine operated under DCC, with lights and sound all controlled from our fingertips. Not that many years ago you could choose to have the light on or off, depending on if there was power to the rails and the engine was moving. Sound was something few if any had, and if they did, it was a PFM system that was OK at best. The cost of these sound systems was the same or more than the AC-4 is today. The current cost of this AC-4 is far less than any of today's brass models of the same type, not to mention the great deal of work you might have to do to get them to run as well .What do you

think is one of the main reasons we have these options today? Could it be the NMRA, PCR, and RED?

If you have not gone to a national train show and seen all the manufacturers showing off their new products, you probably have not listened to the conversations the members are having with these manufacturers. Many of the members are making their wishes known as to the kind of products they would like to see in the future, and the manufacturers are welcoming their input. I am sure there are additional factors in these production choices, but I know that this input carries a lot of weight when it comes to those decisions. Is the primary purpose of our organization to get the kind of models that we want from the manufacturers?

Then we come to the human relations side of things. Do you enjoy getting together with other people who enjoy this hobby of model railroading and sharing ideas as much as I do? Seeing the work of others at a RED meeting when people bring their models to display for a contest or just for show and tell is a satisfying experience. Going to a PCR or NMRA convention and sitting in a clinic, gleaning all the information you can from other members, helps you do a better job with your models, track work, scenery, etc. As an example, I was looking at the Free-mo layout that was at the last PCR convention in Concord and was impressed with the way they had done the tall weeds. I learned that they were using a material call Poly Fiber, which I did not know about, and I began using it on my modules with great results. Just one idea from one meet has made a major difference in my scenery. Seeing the layouts on the tours not only gives you some great ideas but also will inspire you to improve your work. And what about the friends you make? I cannot say enough on this subject. Over the last four years as a Director of the PCR, I have made some wonderful friendships and the kindness from the members will always be remembered.

What do you see as the main purpose of our organization? Obviously, I have trouble coming up with just one or two sentences to state the purpose of the organization. Give it some thought and I am sure you can come up


about. It also makes the shutterbugs happy.

Daylight Division Report

aylight Division held its winter meet in Fresno on February 25 at the home of Marlin Costello and his Goshen and Goosechase Railroad. Some 50 members and guests enjoyed a day of clinics, visiting and operations, followed by an evening of layout tours.

The dos and don'ts of video taping a layout were pointed out by Carter Braxton in his clinic. Carter brought his experience in video broadcast production and editing to the table with a review and critique of the Goshen and Goosechase video he and Marlin had recently put together. Those who saw this clinic had a chance to walk away with copies of the tape.

John Houlihan moved the clinic goers to the patio for a little messier presentation on casting plaster tunnel portholes. John, an avid O-Scaler, stepped down to HO for this presentation so everybody could see the level of detail that this method produces. He cast a sample and put it in the sun to set, while he showed the crowd how to remove a dried casting (prepared in advance) from the forms. While many plaster casting methods use rubber molds, John showed us how to make a form of styrene on a wood base, including such details concrete form lines and a date engraved at the apex of the portal arch.

Ben McDonald came prepared for his clinic on ballasting with roadbed and ties glued to a piece of plywood, ready for ballast. He talked about the various grades and colors of ballast and explained the elements of roadbed, such as culverts and slope. He then demonstrated a technique for applying ballast to various trackage

types, using ballast graded and colored for mainline, branch line, yard and siding. Ben showed us the secrets of selecting a spray bottle with the proper characteristics for wetting down ballast and scenery. After applying the glue, Ben gave everyone a chance to get a close-up look at the results and ask questions.

New Superintendent Pat Boyle led a brisk business meeting. Afterward, former Superintendent Bob Randall conducted a spirited white elephant auction. Several Daylighters competed for the opportunity to enlarge their inventory by bidding for the unknown contents of newspaper-wrapped items. Most were delighted with the contents and one planned to use his winnings to help some Cub Scouts learn about the hobby.

Suffice it to say, this layout is large enough to provide operational and rail-fanning opportunities for everybody at a meet.)

The prototype tours have developed into a really fine selection of first rate choices. The Union Pacific Roseville Yard Tour and the Southern Pacific Shops Tour are guaranteed to be the biggest hits and both have limited availability. The UP Yard Tour will cover many aspects of this five mile long yard that is on the East-West main line. You will see the classification yard, hump yard, dispatching center and maintenance facilities for signal and track crews as well as the engine shop. The SP Shop Tour will cover the erecting and the boiler shops along with a number of lesser shop buildings in the complex. The new transfer table and the old turntable are also included. The huge amount of vintage equipment both inside and outside the buildings will amaze you. A lot of the inside storage is undergoing

restoration work. This tour requires extensive walking over uneven ground. For those of you interested in light rail trains we have the Siemens tour to show you how the cars are built and the Light Rail Shop Tour so you can see how the finished product works and is maintained. Of course, the highlight of any trip to the River City is a tour of the California State Railroad Museum, and we have some docent tours setup. If you have not been to the museum lately you will see the entirely new toy train display that has been set up on the Mezzanine and new life-like manikins that are posed in action settings throughout the displays. For those wanting to ride a real train we have the Yolo Shortline Great Train Robbery and BBQ excursion from Woodland along the Sacramento River to West Sac. and return.

Remember that most tours have limited availability because of bus seating, so order early so as not to be disappointed.

Union Pacific Roseville Yard Tour – This bus tour from the hotel will take you onto the Roseville UP yard. This 5 mile long yard sees both East-West and North-South traffic. There is a large engine repair shop, Amtrak station (old SP style), crew training facilities, signal maintainer and track maintenance shops and facilities as well as a hump yard and large flat classification yard. The new yard headquarters building houses both offices and the local dispatching control. This is a rare opportunity to safely get beyond the public boundaries and be docent led through this vast and interesting facility. This tour has a very limited availability, so be sure to sign up early. Cost – \$20 (Wed. afternoon)

Southern Pacific's Western Division by John Signor

his is another book that was authored within PCR about railroading in PCR and published by a company in PCR. The book first appeared nearly three years ago and it has been waiting in my bookcase to be read for about a year and a half. Although I am not strictly an SP modeler, I do have two interchanges with the SP on my layout, including one within the area of the Western Division. In addition I have lived in and traveled around the Western Division for the

past 40+ years. Before reading this book I really did not have a clear idea of just what parts of SP fell within the Western Division, merely the understanding it was centered in the SF Bay Area and hemmed in by the Coast, Shasta and Sacramento Divisions. I learned a lot from this book.

The author, John Signor, is imminently qualified to write this book, having spent his life around, working for and studying the SP. John's writing is not new to most SP fans, having already produced a couple of books on the Coast Lines; a couple on the Shasta Division; one each on Beaumont Hill, Tehachapi, and

Donner; one on the SP in Mexico, one on the LA & SL and John edits the SP Historical & Technical Society magazine.

The book is 413 pages and includes an index, a section listing all of the SP stations in the Western Division, listed by line with dates and milepost, and bibliography. The main body of the book itself is arranged into six chapters organized into historic periods. For me, the truly outstanding feature of this book is the marvelous photographic coverage of the Western Division from the early days right up to the present. I counted 636 B&W photos and 84 color shots. All of them are crisp,

have a story to tell and the book is printed sharply on high quality paper, making studying these photos a pleasure. The photos alone are more than enough justification to purchase the book. The only complaint I have about the photos is a few of them use the exact same material for the caption as appears in the text sections – I would have preferred having unique complementary information in the captions.


In addition to the photos there are 24 maps, of which I found the 1931 map of the Western Division printed

on the front and back leafs to be the most useful. There are also 44 timetables, schedules and a train sheet and six pieces of artwork. All together, this visual support provides a feeling you know the Division intimately by the time you finish reading the book.

Beyond the fantastic visual documentation, the book is an absolute store of information. This is both a strength and a weakness. Almost anything you want to know about the history of the Division is here. The shear volume of information bogged down my reading enjoyment of sections as I struggled to comprehend the growth and

decline of various individual lines and the appearance and disappearance of both named and numbered trains. Much of this would have been more easily understood if included in tables or charts of some type.

All in all I highly recommend this book both for the casual railroad enthusiast, for the SP fanatic and for the modeler of all or parts of the Western Division. There is enough information in the book to serve as the basis for many prototype based layouts. National Garden Railway Conventions are not that different from PCR and NMRA conventions except the focus is on large scale and mostly outdoors. There will be seven days of layout


tours with 10 to 12 different garden railways on tour each day. If you don't want to use the maps and drive



LAYOUTY DESIGN 6

he year really started off with a bang for us in Northern California: Steve Hayes held his quarterly "first Saturday" invitational run on his Western Pacific layout in Sonora (actually on the second Saturday) and 15 operators from all over the PCR participated. Steve's layout is unusual in that, instead of DCC, it operates by computer controlled cab control, but this complements his CTC dispatching system and all works well together. Our big event was the annual PCR/LD/OP SIG meet, held February 10 – 12. Attendance was 106 this year, and a good time was had by all. The event started with a dinner Friday at Fiorello's in Santa Clara attended by a number of locals and visitors from Phoenix, Reno and Portland. The clinic program began at 9:00 AM at the South Bay Railroad Historical Society's facility in the beautifully restored Santa Clara Depot (built during Lincoln's presidency). We had six excellent clinics:

Four of the clinics discussed modeling a specific prototype or prototypical operation; the others covered mechanical aspects of simulating operations.

The design challenge this year, (organized by Byron Henderson and Bill Kaufman), covered the Parr Terminal/Richmond Pacific Railroad. Five designs were offered and critiqued by a panel of experienced designers drawn from the audience. We learned a lot about how to use space effectively and how design reflects the experiences and interests of the designers.

Finally Bruce Morden organized a panel about "Getting off your duff ... and building something." Bruce, Ed Loizeaux, Jim Radkey and Byron Henderson discussed their experiences and what it took to get motivated to

achieve their layout goals, whether building or operating.

All the while Byron had the consulting program going in the back room and 15 attendees got personalized consultation on their designs.

Saturday evening was dedicated to layout tours and nine local layouts were open for inspection, organized by Mike Birmingham .

Sunday, David Parks organized the Operating program with six layouts open to 62 operators. Visitors were encouraged to drop in and observe, though most were pressed into service moving tonnage over the road!

Looking forward, we are planning the Layout Design/ Operations track Thursday at the River City Express in Sacramento, May 3-9. We'll have several clinics followed by the Design and Ops forums in the evening. Bring your plans and questions and we'll try to help!
